

2026 LCMS Synodical Convention

Major Issues to Watch

A print-friendly handout for pastors, elders, delegates, and congregational leaders

Main thesis

The central issue beneath many issues is whether the LCMS can remain boldly confessional, genuinely evangelical, missionally awake, and relationally trustworthy at the same time.

At a glance

The 2026 convention appears less like a single-issue debate and more like a convergence of trust, formation, doctrine, governance, worship, and mission. Congregations should pay attention because several decisions could shape pastoral supply, altar care, institutional accountability, Lutheran identity, and local mission support.

Rank	Watch zone	Why it matters
1	Pastoral formation and SMP	Future pastors, vacancies, mission starts, SMP policy, and ecclesiology.
2	Life Together issues	Mission priorities, worship, ministry partners, sexuality, AI, social media, race, and civic religion.
3	Doctrine issues	Communion, women lectors or suffrage, IVF, fellowship, mission language, and doctrinal boundaries.
4	Governance and representation	Who steers Synod, how congregations are represented, and how authority is structured.
5	Dispute resolution and supervision	Whether conflict is handled evangelically, fairly, promptly, and with due process.

How to use this handout

Use this as a conversation starter, not as a substitute for reading the Workbook, floor committee resolutions, and official convention materials. For elders, the key question is: Which convention issues could affect our calling to shepherd souls, guard the altar, support the pastor, form disciples, care for families, raise up leaders, and keep the congregation focused on Christ crucified and risen?

Major issue clusters

These are the issue lanes most likely to matter for local congregations. Some are doctrinal, some are governance-related, and some are practical ministry questions wearing a bylaw hat.

Issue 1. Pastoral formation, SMP, seminaries, and pastoral shortage

Why it matters: This may be the most consequential long-term issue. Congregations need faithful pastors, and Synod must weigh residential formation, SMP, alternate routes, online or hybrid education, church planting, ethnic ministry, rural ministry, and smaller congregations.

Watch for: Whether the convention tightens, loosens, restructures, studies, or rebalances pastoral formation and SMP.

Issue 2. Mission priorities and congregational sustainability

Why it matters: The debate is not just slogans. It asks what story the LCMS tells about its purpose, and whether national emphases help congregations make disciples, plant, revitalize, teach families, and witness locally.

Watch for: Whether mission language remains Gospel-centered and congregationally useful, or becomes institutional wallpaper.

Issue 3. Worship, Communion practice, and faithful variety

Why it matters: Elders and pastors carry local responsibility for altar care, visitor conversations, catechesis, worship order, and pastoral exceptions. Convention language here can shape expectations back home.

Watch for: Closed Communion, weekly Communion, first Communion before confirmation, chalice, approved worship resources, and review of new worship practices.

Issue 4. Doctrinal boundary questions

Why it matters: Doctrine is not a side dish. The convention will handle questions involving Communion, fellowship, creation, Christ's descent into hell, IVF, women lectors, woman suffrage, mission language, and more.

Watch for: Whether issues are resolved by confession, referral for study, pastoral admonition, bylaw change, or careful restraint.

Issue 5. Ecclesiastical supervision and dispute resolution

Why it matters: Church discipline and dispute resolution should serve repentance, restoration, truth, due process, and the care of souls, not simply create an exhausting church-court maze.

Watch for: Reform or replacement of current dispute processes, social media accusations, transparency, confidentiality, and appeal structures.

Issue 6. Governance, representation, elections, and structure

Why it matters: Governance is the plumbing of church life. Nobody praises plumbing until it breaks, then everyone becomes a pipe theologian. These questions shape who steers Synod and how congregations are represented.

Watch for: Possible restructuring, representation rules, board and commission authority, term limits, convention cycles, and concentration of authority.

Major issue clusters, continued

Issue 7. LCMS educational institutions and Lutheran identity

Why it matters: LCMS educational institutions help shape future teachers, church workers, pastors, musicians, lay leaders, and Lutheran families. Institutional trust and clear Lutheran identity matter for the whole church.

Watch for: Structure, Lutheran identity standards, prior approval, worship practices, and transparency after institutional turmoil.

Issue 8. Ministry partners, sexuality, family care, and cultural pressure

Why it matters: These issues are not merely culture-war topics. They arrive locally as pastoral care for sons, daughters, parents, visitors, students, and neighbors who need both biblical clarity and Christlike mercy.

Watch for: Accountability for recognized ministry partners, sexuality-related concerns, cohabitation, care for families, and how grace and truth are spoken together.

Issue 9. AI, sermons, truthfulness, and digital trust

Why it matters: AI is already affecting overtures, sermons, education, communication, and research. The issue is not technology itself, but truthfulness, pastoral responsibility, confidentiality, and trust.

Watch for: AI-created sermons, fake citations, confidentiality, sermon preparation boundaries, and public communications.

Issue 10. Money, transparency, litigation, seminaries, and resources

Why it matters: Finances and institutional decisions shape trust. Benefits, publishing access, seminary funding, legal expenses, and reporting practices all affect how congregations view Synod's stewardship.

Watch for: Benefit structures, publishing access, Bible translations, access to Lutheran resources, seminary funding, and accounting or transparency around litigation.

Practical impact on local congregations

For elders and leaders

The goal is not panic, factional scorekeeping, or Synodical sports-radio commentary. The goal is faithful local shepherding with eyes open.

- Future vacancies and the availability of pastors.
- How elders explain and support Communion practice.
- How congregations handle online conflict, accusations, and discipline.
- How congregations participate in church planting, revitalization, and local witness.
- How pastors and leaders use AI without outsourcing proclamation or pastoral judgment.
- How congregations evaluate and support LCMS educational, mercy, mission, and administrative structures.

Elder conversation guide

Use these questions in a board of elders, church council, delegate prep meeting, or pastor-led discussion. Keep the conversation local, pastoral, and Gospel-forward.

Area	Conversation question
Pastoral formation	How do we uphold faithful formation while also addressing the real need for pastors with urgency?
Worship and Communion	Are our elders equipped to explain Communion practice with both clarity and warmth?
Mission	Does this convention action help congregations proclaim Christ, form disciples, and send people into the community?
Governance	Does this structure build accountability, transparency, and trust, or does it mainly add machinery?
Conflict	How do we preserve Matthew 18, due process, pastoral care, and accountability without making discipline a public spectacle?
AI	What boundaries should we expect around AI in sermons, pastoral care, teaching, and communication?
Mercy and family	Can we speak clearly according to Scripture while caring tenderly for people who are hurting, confused, ashamed, or afraid?

A helpful filter

When debating overtures, ask whether the issue is doctrinal, practical, procedural, relational, or rhetorical. Then ask whether a preference is being treated as doctrine, or whether mission language is being used without clear Gospel substance.

Best posture for delegates and elders

Watch the distinctions

- Doctrine from preference.
- Confession from control.
- Mission from branding.
- Pastoral care from public combat.
- Accountability from bureaucracy.
- The Office of the Ministry from clericalism.
- Lay service from office-confusion.
- Technology as a tool from technology as a substitute for shepherding.

Scripture anchors

Matthew 28:19-20

Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age.

1 Corinthians 11:28-29

Let a person examine himself, then, and so eat of the bread and drink of the cup. For anyone who eats and drinks without discerning the body eats and drinks judgment on himself.

If your brother sins against you, go and tell him his fault, between you and him alone. If he listens to you, you have gained your brother.

And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen his glory, glory as of the only Son from the Father, full of grace and truth.

Closing Gospel frame

Christ is risen, and the church belongs to Him

The Synod does not gather to save itself. Christ is risen. The church lives because Jesus lives. The convention serves the Gospel, the confession of the church, and the sending of Christ's people into the harvest.

Not confessional without mission. Not mission without confession. Not governance without accountability. Not accountability without mercy. Not unity by pretending disagreements do not exist. Not purity by eating one another alive in the fellowship hall.
