The official order of business called for Midday Prayer, presidential-election reporting, vice-presidential elections, Omnibus Resolutions A-C, nominations, an international mission presentation, International Witness business, Life Together business, and Evening Prayer.¹

Verification posture

Official convention texts control for resolution wording, amendments, vote totals, and bylaw actions. The transcript is used for debate, questions, floor explanations, and procedural rulings. Where automatic captions conflict with printed official materials, the printed source is preferred.²

EXECUTIVE ALERT

■ What Every Delegate Should Remember

The session in one sentence

The convention elected its vice-presidential leadership, processed a large body of overtures through omnibus actions, expanded international mission partnership and missionary care, created a new framework for overseas ecclesiastical supervision, adopted “Tell the Next Generation,” and reinstated the Commission on Worship.

- Rev. Dr. Matthew C. Harrison was officially announced as elected to a sixth term as President of Synod.
- Rev. Peter K. Lange was elected First Vice-President, and five regional vice-presidents were elected and ranked.
- All three omnibus resolutions passed by overwhelming margins, and every attempt to extract an individual overture failed.
- International mission resolutions strongly endorsed FORO partnerships, direct missionary support, missionary chaplaincy, and a new framework for service to independent Lutheran congregations overseas.
- The convention adopted Tell the Next Generation as the Synod mission and ministry emphasis for the triennium.
- Resolution 4-06A reinstated the Commission on Worship, passing 67.96% to 32.04%, the most divided major decision of the session.

Delegate alert

No floor amendment passed during this session. One proposed bylaw amendment was ruled out of order, the R-1 visa amendment was ruled not germane, and a proposed amendment to Resolution 4-06A was ruled out of order before its wording was fully stated.

The session’s broadest consensus gathered around international mission, missionary care, and generational witness. Its sharpest division involved worship governance, liturgical uniformity, Christian freedom, cost, appointments, and the need for a permanent commission.

Gospel center

The convention Bible study insists that the resurrection is not merely a future doctrine. In Holy Baptism, Christ has already joined His people to His death and resurrection, sending them to live as His witnesses in a dying world.³ The convention theme itself is drawn from 1 Corinthians 15:20-22.⁴

CHRONOLOGICAL RECORD

■ Chronological Session Overview

1. Midday Prayer: Christ Draws Near on the Road

The session opened with Midday Prayer led by the Rev. Brady L. Finner. Psalm 118 and Luke 24:13-35 framed the assembly with the risen Jesus drawing near to discouraged disciples on the road to Emmaus.

The devotion's practical theological claim was simple and decisive: the disciples did not rescue themselves by producing better information or stronger faith. Christ came near, opened the Scriptures, revealed Himself, and turned sorrowing travelers into witnesses.

Pastoral note

The floor business that followed was therefore not merely executive selection or committee architecture. It was work undertaken by people whose hope rests in the crucified and risen Christ, present through His Word and gifts.

2. Announcement of the Presidential Election

The convention received the official results of the June congregational balloting. Matthew C. Harrison was elected to a sixth term after receiving a majority on the third ballot. The official printed report, rather than the transcript's corrupted automatic captions, supplies the figures below.⁵

President Harrison responded with humor about the Synod's perfect record of electing sinners, spoke of family losses and the burden of service, and promised to lead through the Gospel rather than coercion. That promise deserves continued attention wherever convention actions touch supervision, discipline, authority, or institutional control.

3. Credentials Report

The report was adopted 913 to 8, approximately 99.13%, establishing the voting strength of the assembly.

4. Election of the First Vice-President

The official slate contained Christopher S. Esget, Alfonso O. Espinosa, Eric T. Lange, Peter K. Lange, and Don R. Stuckwisch Jr. The slate and election procedures were governed by the Synod's bylaws and official nominee materials.⁶

The convention used successive majority ballots, eliminating the lowest vote-getter until each ranking was determined.

7. Concordia Plan Services Presentation

Kevin Herweck reported strong pension funding, investment performance, retirement-savings growth, below-average healthcare increases, significant mental-health counseling utilization, lower disability-plan costs, and a new property-and-casualty captive. These were presentation claims, not separate convention actions.

Ministry implication

Worker care is not decorative overhead. Health coverage, retirement stability, disability support, counseling, and insurance directly affect whether pastors, teachers, and other church workers can remain in service.

PROCEDURAL ACTION

Omnibus Resolution Analysis

The official materials categorized the omnibus resolutions as follows: Omnibus A referred matters to other Synod bodies; Omnibus B treated matters as addressed by prior convention action; and Omnibus C received encouragement and gratitude.⁷

Important distinction

An omnibus vote did not adopt each underlying overture as written. Referral is not approval, and prior-action treatment is not a fresh substantive ruling on every claim.

Omnibus Resolution A

Delegates attempted to remove numerous overtures for separate floor consideration, including matters involving Concordia University Ann Arbor, call accuracy, publication of the Council of Presidents manual, CTCR assignments, university transparency, the annotated Large Catechism, HotChalk litigation, the Synod's COVID-19 response, national school-protection standards, and protection of missionary Divine Calls. Every extraction motion failed.

Final action: Debate closed with 92.3% support. Omnibus Resolution A passed 93.25% to 6.75%.

Omnibus Resolution B

Attempts to remove overtures concerning women's suffrage and family discipleship also failed. A point of order clarified that the motion included both the original and supplemental omnibus material.

Final action: Debate closed with 92.48% support. Omnibus Resolution B passed 92.37% to 7.63%.

Omnibus Resolution C

No individual item was removed. Omnibus Resolution C passed 97.06% to 2.94%.

Trust and accountability watch

Omnibus processing saved time, but referred matters should not vanish into the ecclesiastical junk drawer. Trust requires public follow-through: what was reviewed, what was decided, and what will happen next.

Nominations for Secretary and the Synod Board of Directors

The Committee for Convention Nominations reported 459 nominees, 376 consenting to consideration for at least one position, 142 candidates placed on ballots, and 62 positions to be filled. Official slates were presented for Secretary and Synod Board of Directors positions. No floor nominations were offered, nominations were closed, and voting was scheduled for the following day.

The committee also explained that adoption of Resolution 4-06A would activate elections for members of the reinstated Commission on Worship. Because 4-06A passed, those elections became necessary.

INTERNATIONAL WITNESS

■ International Mission Presentation

Missionary Tyler McMiller described Lutheran preaching stations and congregational hubs in Italy, newly ordained pastors, online catechesis, house churches, Bible studies, and the challenge of proclaiming justification by grace in a setting shaped by cultural Christianity and sacramental uncertainty.

A story about Carlo and the prodigal son supplied the Gospel center: the sinner does not earn a path back into the Father's household. The Father receives sinners because Christ has borne their sin and opened the way home.

FORO partnership model

The presentation described FOROs as relational mission forums in which missionaries, congregations, districts, schools, Recognized Service Organizations, partner churches, and individual Christians cooperate rather than merely exchanging distant financial support.

Resolution 2-01A: Armed Forces Ministry

Resolution 2-01A was referenced during the afternoon but had already been adopted on the morning consent calendar. It gave thanks for ministry to members of the armed forces and encouraged continued support for military chaplaincy and Operation Barnabas. No new floor action occurred during this session.

Resolution 2-02A: International Mission Partnership

Purpose. Encourage prayer, partnership, participation, and direct congregational involvement in international mission through FOROs, missionary support, and other faithful partnerships.

Main actions. The resolution gave thanks for existing FOROs; directed each district to assess adopting or supporting a FORO partnership; encouraged future district-convention proposals; encouraged congregational prayer and missionary adoption; directed OIM to develop a communication plan; and commended partnership opportunities for prayerful consideration.

Debate. Supporters emphasized that international mission belongs to the whole church and that prayer, relationship, participation, and financial support belong together. A supporter also cautioned that faithful mission partnerships already exist outside formal FORO structures. No substantive theological opposition was expressed.

Final vote. The previous question passed 98.07%. Resolution 2-02A passed 96.97% to 3.03%.

Kingdom implication

This action moves international mission closer to congregational relationships. It will succeed when districts provide simple pathways into real partnerships, not merely another polished binder that enjoys a long and peaceful retirement on the church-office shelf.

Resolution 2-03A: Regional Missionary Chaplaincy

Purpose. Give thanks for missionary care and expand full-time regional missionary chaplaincy.

The resolution commended existing OIM care, directed the establishment of a full-time chaplaincy in each region by 2029 "as feasible and necessary," encouraged prayer and support for missionaries, and rejoiced in the Gospel proclaimed through them. The official estimate anticipated approximately \$800,000 in annual cost, expected to be supported through restricted missionary-support resources.⁹

Questions raised. Delegates asked whether missionaries wanted chaplains, how chaplaincy relates to district-president supervision, whether existing care teams were sufficient, whether chaplains would be physically present, whether the worker shortage made the plan realistic, and whether restricted funds could properly support the positions.

Strongest support. Missionaries need pastors, not merely supervisors or human-resource processes. Geographic distance magnifies isolation, and pastoral care strengthens endurance and retention.

Legitimate concerns. Recruitment, role clarity, duplication of oversight, and long-term funding will require disciplined implementation.

Final vote. Debate closed 97.09%. Resolution 2-03A passed 90.78% to 9.22%.

Pastoral note

The resolution treats care for missionaries as part of mission itself. Burnout is not a spiritual discipline, and isolation is not a sacrament.

BYLAW ACTION

■ Resolution 2-04: Framework for Independent International Congregations

Official purpose. Amend Bylaws 1.7.3, 2.11.1, 3.8.3, 3.8.3.8, and 4.4.4-5 to establish ecclesiastical supervision and pastoral care for independent international congregations.

LCMS pastors and commissioned ministers may serve independent Lutheran congregations outside the United States that are neither LCMS members nor members of recognized partner churches. The resolution sought a clearer framework for approval, active-roster status, ecclesiastical supervision, OIM involvement, withdrawal of approval, and cooperation among district presidents, the Board for International Mission, OIM, and the President of Synod.¹⁰

Main Provisions

- 1 The served congregation may not belong to another church body.
- 2 It must agree to honor the LCMS confession, Constitution, Bylaws, and convention resolutions.
- 3 It must have, or be calling, an LCMS member as head or sole pastor.
- 4 Domestic arrangements remain under the appropriate district president.
- 5 Foreign arrangements involve the BIM, OIM, President of Synod, and supervising district president.
- 6 The independent congregation remains the calling body.
- 7 The LCMS worker remains under ecclesiastical supervision.
- 8 Approval may be withdrawn under established procedures.
- 9 OIM may assist district presidents with supervision and liaison work.
- 10 BIM and the Council of Presidents must jointly develop policies and report to the 2029 convention.

Debate and Clarifications

- Why include domestic congregations? Existing domestic provisions supplied the legal and ecclesiastical framework being extended overseas; the action did not create international districts or circuits.
- What does “honor” mean? The committee described a voluntary agreement to live within the Synod’s confession and governing documents, likely documented in a written agreement.
- Does withdrawal terminate the Divine Call? The Secretary clarified that withdrawal of Synod approval would not itself abolish the congregation’s call, though it could affect active LCMS roster recognition.
- Why is the framework needed? Independent congregations have requested relationships and pastoral support where no practical LCMS membership pathway exists.

Proposed amendment

Jeff Reese moved to replace “honor” with “abide by.” The chair ruled the amendment out of order because the altered bylaw language had not received Commission on Constitutional Matters review. The assembly did not vote on the amendment.

Strongest case for adoption. The resolution creates a lawful mission pathway, protects supervision and roster clarity, provides confessional accountability, avoids claiming foreign jurisdiction, and serves congregations asking for pastoral care.

Strongest legitimate concern. “Honor” may remain imprecise; foreign application of every Synod resolution may be difficult; authority is dispersed among several bodies; withdrawal of approval may have serious pastoral consequences; and the final policies could become more controlling than serving.

Final vote. Resolution 2-04 passed 90.97% to 9.03%.

Governance lens

This resolution seeks high accountability without creating international districts. The implementation test will be whether the developing policies use consultation, transparent agreements, defined appeals, and minimal unnecessary bureaucracy.

■ Resolution 2-05: Latin America and Caribbean Missions

Purpose. Celebrate 125 years of Gospel ministry in Latin America and the Caribbean and encourage continued partnership, theological education, missionary support, and church planting.

The resolution thanked God for mission beginning with work in Brazil, recognized partner churches and missionary families, encouraged Spanish-language theological education and pastoral formation, and invited prayer, gifts, short-term teams, FORO participation, church planting, and the strengthening of confessional Lutheran churches.

R-1 visa amendment

Joshua Salzberg proposed adding a resolve encouraging Synod entities, including the Lutheran Center for Religious Liberty, to advocate for restoration of R-1 Religious Worker visas for affected countries.¹⁶ The chair ruled the amendment not germane to the anniversary and mission-celebration resolution. It was not voted on and did not become part of the resolution.

Final vote. Resolution 2-05 passed by an overwhelmingly affirmative voice vote. No numerical total was announced.

The ruling did not declare the visa concern unimportant. It determined that the concern fell outside the scope of this resolution and would need to return through another parliamentary path.

LIFE TOGETHER

■ Mission Emphasis and Enduring Priorities

Resolution 4-01: Tell the Next Generation

The convention adopted “Tell the Next Generation” as the Synod’s mission and ministry emphasis for 2026-2029. No substantive opposition was expressed, and the resolution passed by voice vote.

The emphasis naturally touches Baptismal identity, family catechesis, Lutheran schools, youth ministry, campus ministry, vocational encouragement, and the intergenerational transmission of the faith.

Teaching application

The emphasis will be fruitful when it equips parents, grandparents, pastors, teachers, and congregations to speak God’s Word in ordinary homes and daily vocations. It will be less fruitful if it becomes primarily a slogan, logo, or reporting category.

Resolution 4-02A: Future Mission and Ministry Emphases

The resolution charged the Boards for National and International Mission, working with the President of Synod and in fraternal conversation with districts, to recommend future mission and ministry emphases for convention consideration. It passed by voice vote.

The strongest feature is earlier collaboration. The implementation concern is whether district consultation is genuinely formative or simply receives a nearly finished proposal after the cake is already iced.

Resolution 4-03: Constitutional Objectives as Enduring Priorities

The resolution commended the Synod’s constitutional objectives as faithful mission priorities, gave thanks for mission-board and district conversations, recognized earlier priorities, and reaffirmed the mission boards’ role in identifying goals. It passed by voice vote with one audible dissent.

Helpful distinction

The confession is permanent. The Synod’s constitutional objectives provide enduring direction. Triennial emphases focus attention. Programs and slogans remain tools, not substitute confessions.

CLOSEST MAJOR VOTE

■ Resolution 4-06A: Reinstate the Commission on Worship

Resolution 4-06A amended the Bylaws to restore a permanent Commission on Worship. The former commission had been eliminated in the 2010 restructuring, while worship-related work continued within the Office of National Mission. Supporters argued that the Synod again needed a permanent bylaw-established body for worship resources, hymnological work, evaluation, and long-term planning.¹⁵

Main Provisions

- Add the Commission on Worship to Bylaw 3.9.
- Establish a seven-member commission.
- Provide three convention-elected members and four presidentially appointed members.
- Include the executive director and additional persons in an advisory capacity.
- Establish staggered terms and vacancy procedures.
- Refer relevant worship overtures to the commission.
- Anticipate approximately \$175,000 annually for staffing, meetings, and resources.

Significant Revisions in the “A” Version

- “Other persons” became “additional persons.”
- “Serve as advisory members” became “serve in an advisory capacity.”
- “After consultation” became “in consultation.”
- Term, vacancy, and election provisions were clarified.
- A redundant resolve was removed.

Strongest Arguments in Support

- Worship is central to the church’s life and deserves permanent expertise.
- Hymnal supplements and future hymnals require long-term institutional responsibility.
- New worship materials and contemporary music need theological evaluation.
- Congregations, pastors, and musicians need practical resources and teaching.
- Lutheran hymnody is a major instrument of catechesis and intergenerational formation.

Strongest Legitimate Concerns

- The commission could encourage liturgical enforcement or unnecessary uniformity.
- Bylaw language was being adopted under conditions that limited floor amendment.
- The commission could duplicate work already performed elsewhere.
- The annual cost may not produce proportionate congregational benefit.
- Four presidential appointments create a majority of the seven-member body.
- Uniformity language could overshadow lawful variety and Christian freedom.

The confessional issue is not order versus chaos. The Lutheran Confessions defend good order that teaches Christ while also rejecting the imposition of human ceremonies as though they were divinely necessary for salvation or church unity.¹³

Proposed amendment

Carol Ko sought to amend the proposed bylaw language. The exact replacement wording was not read into the transcript before the chair ruled the amendment out of order for lack of prior constitutional review. No amendment was adopted.

Final vote. Resolution 4-06A passed 67.96% to 32.04%. The Commission on Worship was reinstated, triggering elections and appointments under the adopted structure.

Kingdom-over-Castle test

The commission can serve the Kingdom by assisting, teaching, evaluating, and producing resources. It can drift toward castle-building if it treats preferences as doctrine, expands machinery without useful products, or uses uniformity to bind consciences. The most faithful culture will be confessionally strong, transparent, congregationally useful, and low-control.

AUDIT TRAIL

■ Amendments and Procedural Motions

Amendment audit result

No floor amendment passed. Therefore, no amendment altered the final text of any resolution adopted during this session.

Numerous omnibus extraction motions were made, but those were procedural motions to consider overtures separately, not amendments to the overtures themselves. Every extraction motion failed.

■ Significant Official Decisions

Elections

- Matthew C. Harrison was officially announced as President-elect.
- Peter K. Lange was elected First Vice-President.
- Benjamin T. Ball, Christopher S. Esget, Eric C. Skovgaard, Nabil S. Nour, and Alfonso O. Espinosa were elected regional vice-presidents.
- The regional vice-presidents were ranked second through sixth.

Omnibus Actions

- Omnibus A referred matters to designated Synod bodies.
- Omnibus B accepted the committees' judgment that prior action sufficiently addressed the listed overtures.
- Omnibus C received expressions of gratitude and encouragement.

Mission and Governance

- District and congregational participation in international mission partnerships was encouraged.
- Regional missionary chaplaincy was approved.
- A bylaw framework for LCMS workers serving independent international congregations was established.
- "Tell the Next Generation" was adopted for the triennium.
- The process for future mission emphases was revised.
- The Commission on Worship was reinstated.

FROM CONVENTION FLOOR TO LOCAL MINISTRY

■ Ministry Implications

Congregations

Expect new invitations into FORO partnerships, missionary prayer and support, intergenerational catechesis, and future worship resources. Congregations should also ask whether omnibus referrals receive public follow-through.

Pastors

Pastors may receive clearer pathways for overseas service, stronger missionary-care systems, new worship resources, and renewed expectations around generational catechesis. Those serving abroad should study the forthcoming policies carefully.

Church workers

The session treated counseling, retirement, disability support, pastoral chaplaincy, supervision, and relational care as essential to sustainable service.

District leadership

Districts will assess mission partnerships, participate in future emphasis development, support international supervision, and translate Synodwide actions into local congregational opportunity.

Seminaries

Seminaries may contribute to missionary-chaplain formation, international-service preparation, hymnology, catechetical resources, and theological guidance for independent congregations.

International mission

The convention advanced relational partnership, congregational missionary support, care for workers, confessional accountability, and cooperation among districts, mission boards, OIM, and congregations.

Lutheran education and catechesis

“Tell the Next Generation” should involve parents, schools, youth ministry, campus ministry, grandparents, future church workers, and ordinary household teaching.

Evangelism

The Italy presentation modeled evangelism grounded in justification by grace, patient relationships, local leaders, theological education, and church planting, rather than exporting an American ecclesiastical culture.

Mercy and worker care

Even without Floor Committee 3 business, mercy appeared in missionary care, counseling, disability support, retirement security, chaplaincy, and concern for workers affected by immigration policy.

Walther's service principle

Walther argued that Synod exists to serve congregations, pool resources, strengthen pastors and teachers, promote confessional unity, and avoid imposing demands not grounded in God's Word.¹⁴ That remains a useful test for every new structure adopted in this session.

HARVEST PARTNERSHIP LENS

■ Kingdom Over Castle Analysis

The Harvest Partnership values of the Spirit's Sending, Kingdom Focus, Open-Handed Generosity, Humility, and Trust provide a practical mission lens without functioning as a new confessional test.¹¹

The Spirit's Sending

The international mission presentation and Resolution 2-02A assumed that the Spirit is already at work among people and communities across the world. FORO partnership invites the baptized to join relationships already being formed rather than treating national offices as the sole owners of mission.

Kingdom Focus

The mission resolutions and "Tell the Next Generation" can keep the church focused on proclaiming Christ, forming disciples, raising workers, planting churches, and strengthening congregations. The danger is replacing mission with branding, reporting, or institutional maintenance.

Open-Handed Generosity

Congregations were invited to release prayer, money, workers, time, knowledge, and relationships. Missionary support was presented as shared participation, not merely a transaction with a distant office.

Humility

The healthiest partnership language recognized that no congregation carries the whole mission, districts have different capacities, multiple models can serve faithfully, and international churches are partners rather than projects.

Trust: High Accountability, Low Control

Resolution 2-04 is the clearest test. It needs written expectations, confessional accountability, supervision, and avenues for consultation, yet should avoid turning service relationships into remote institutional control. The 2023 Handbook provides the governing framework within which those responsibilities must be developed.¹²

Commission on Worship

The commission can serve congregations by producing reliable resources, supporting pastors and musicians, evaluating materials, preserving Lutheran hymnody, and helping churches with limited local expertise. It can become a castle structure if it treats preferences as doctrine or measures Lutheran faithfulness by one congregational culture.

Omnibus Actions

Efficient processing is good stewardship. Yet repeated referral without transparent reporting can erode trust. The Great Sending is not served by endless institutional motion that produces no clear congregational fruit.

Decision filter

Ask of every convention action: Does it serve Christ's Gospel? Does it equip congregations? Does it protect confession without binding consciences? Does it create accountability without unnecessary control? Does it send people into the harvest rather than merely preserve machinery?

DISCERNMENT AND PRAYER

■ Questions Delegates Should Continue Asking

- 1 How will districts be helped to enter FORO partnerships without creating excessive administration?
- 2 How will small congregations participate meaningfully in international mission?
- 3 What standards will determine when a regional missionary chaplain is “feasible and necessary”?
- 4 How will missionary chaplains remain pastors rather than primarily supervisors?
- 5 What will “honor” Synod resolutions mean for foreign congregations under Resolution 2-04?
- 6 What consultation and appeal processes will precede withdrawal of approval?
- 7 How will international congregations help shape the policies that govern these relationships?
- 8 What concrete resources will accompany “Tell the Next Generation”?
- 9 How will the Synod avoid turning a mission emphasis into an informal loyalty test?
- 10 Will the Commission on Worship primarily assist congregations or regulate them?
- 11 How will the commission honor both confessional order and Christian freedom?
- 12 What measurable products should justify the commission’s annual cost?
- 13 How will omnibus referrals be tracked and publicly reported?
- 14 When will responsible boards and commissions report what they did with referred overtures?
- 15 What does the strong preference for omnibus handling reveal about time, trust, and convention culture?

■ Things to Pray About

Synod leadership: That President Harrison, First Vice-President Lange, and the regional vice-presidents would lead through the Word of Christ, exercise authority as service, and seek the good of congregations.

Delegates: For attentiveness, courage, charity, patience, and wisdom to distinguish doctrine from judgment and preference.

Missionaries: For protection, endurance, faithful proclamation, healthy families, supportive congregations, and pastors who care for their souls.

International congregations: For faithful pastors, clear teaching, wise supervision, and relationships that strengthen rather than dominate.

Congregations: That they would receive international mission as part of their Baptismal vocation and not as distant work belonging to others.

The next generation: That parents, pastors, teachers, grandparents, and congregations would speak of Christ faithfully in homes, schools, workplaces, and daily life.

Commission on Worship: That it would produce faithful and beautiful resources, guard Christian freedom, strengthen congregational song, and keep Christ’s gifts central.

Unity in the Gospel: That disagreement would not become contempt, agreement would not become complacency, and unity would remain rooted in the Gospel and Sacraments.

Closing prayer

Lord Jesus Christ, risen from the dead, keep Your Church steadfast in Your Word. Give wisdom to those elected, courage to those sent, comfort to missionaries and their families, and joy to congregations that proclaim Your name. Guard us from pride, fear, control, and distraction. Teach us to use every structure, office, commission, and convention action in service to Your Gospel. Send us into Your harvest with open hands, humble hearts, and confidence in Your victory. Amen.

NEXT-SESSION PREPARATION**■ Looking Ahead****Confirmed Matters to Watch**

- Secretary and Board of Directors elections. The official slate was received, and elections were scheduled for the next session.
- Commission on Worship elections. Adoption of Resolution 4-06A activated convention elections for designated commission positions.
- International mission implementation. OIM must develop communication pathways, continue FORO development, and explore regional chaplaincy.
- Resolution 2-04 policies. BIM and the Council of Presidents must develop detailed policies and report to the 2029 convention.
- Tell the Next Generation. Delegates should watch for leadership, resources, funding, district roles, and congregational applications.
- Omnibus referrals. Responsible boards, commissions, and offices should acknowledge, study, and report on referred matters.

It is reasonable to expect continued discussion of university transparency, ecclesiastical supervision, worship, pastoral formation, and institutional accountability. It would be speculation to predict that any particular referred overture will return to the floor during this convention.

Five Most Important Decisions

- 1 The convention received Matthew C. Harrison's election to a sixth term and elected the vice-presidential leadership.
- 2 The Synod embraced wider district and congregational participation in international mission.
- 3 The convention approved expanded missionary chaplaincy and pastoral care.
- 4 A new bylaw framework was adopted for LCMS workers serving independent international congregations.
- 5 The Commission on Worship was reinstated with a permanent bylaw structure.

Five Most Significant Ministry Implications

- 1 International mission will increasingly be framed as a congregational relationship, not only a national-office program.
- 2 Missionary care is being treated as an essential component of mission.
- 3 Pastors serving abroad will have clearer supervision and roster expectations.
- 4 "Tell the Next Generation" will shape catechesis, family ministry, schools, youth work, and communications.
- 5 Worship guidance and resource development will again flow through a permanent commission.

Five Questions Every Delegate Should Continue Asking

- 1 Does this action equip congregations, or mainly enlarge institutional machinery?
- 2 Is authority being exercised as service and accountability, or as unnecessary control?
- 3 Does the proposal protect confession without treating preferences as doctrine?
- 4 What reporting will demonstrate that the action is being implemented?
- 5 How will this decision help the baptized confess Christ and carry the Gospel into the harvest?

FAST REVIEW

■ One-Page Delegate Brief

What happened

Matthew Harrison's election to a sixth term was officially announced. Peter Lange was elected First Vice-President, five regional vice-presidents were elected and ranked, all three omnibus resolutions passed, four international mission resolutions were adopted, "Tell the Next Generation" became the triennial emphasis, and the Commission on Worship was reinstated.

Why it matters

The session moved the Synod toward deeper international mission partnerships and stronger missionary care. It also increased structure in international ecclesiastical supervision and worship governance. The mission actions invite cooperation, prayer, financial support, and shared responsibility. The worship action creates new capacity but requires vigilance against binding consciences or expanding control.

What to watch next

- Secretary and Board of Directors elections.
- Commission on Worship nominees and elections.
- Implementation details for international supervision.
- Funding and recruitment for missionary chaplaincy.
- Practical congregational resources for "Tell the Next Generation."
- Public follow-through on omnibus referrals.

Gospel frame

No election, commission, bylaw, or mission model preserves the Church. Christ crucified and risen preserves His Church through His Word and Sacraments. Convention actions are faithful when they serve that Gospel, strengthen congregations, care for workers, guard the confession, and send Christ's people joyfully into the harvest.

Christ is risen indeed. Therefore the Church does not labor from fear, defend castles for their own sake, or place her hope in organizational charts. She receives Christ's gifts, walks together in confession, and goes where her risen Lord sends her.

■ Verification and Review Notes

- The official schedule and printed resolutions were checked against Today's Business, Issues 1 and 2B.⁸
- Presidential election totals were taken from the official printed report, not the error-prone automatic transcript.

- Resolution 2-01A was mentioned but had already been adopted during the morning consent calendar.
- No floor amendment passed during this session.

The delegate's continuing task is not merely to remember which motions passed. It is to ask whether implementation remains faithful to Scripture, the Lutheran Confessions, the Synod's constitutional order, congregational vocation, and the shared sending of Christ's people.

No convention vote saves or preserves the Church. Christ crucified and risen preserves His Church through His Word and Sacraments. Convention work should serve His Gospel, the church's confession, and the sending of Christ's people into the harvest.¹⁸
