FINAL SESSION AND HOMEWARD BRIEFING

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■ Source and Scope Correction

The assignment template contained leftover references to a Monday afternoon session, preparation for Tuesday, and unresolved business returning the next day. The attached transcript actually covers **Session 9, Thursday morning, July 23, 2026**, the final convention session, beginning with Matins and ending with adjournment *sine die*.¹

- This report reconstructs the final Thursday morning session and explains what became convention action and what did not.
- It uses the transcript for chronology, debate, oral motions, rulings, atmosphere, and recording timestamps.¹
- It uses *Today's Business*, Issue 6, for the final-day schedule and the printed delegate resolutions.²
- It uses the official LCMS Reporter final-day coverage to corroborate resolution titles and reported outcomes.³
- The LCMS resolution-status page remains preliminary until results appear in approved minutes.⁴

Verification caution

Approved Session 9 minutes were not included in the supplied file set. The official convention page stated that the July 23 minutes would appear later in the Convention Proceedings. The transcript and official final-day coverage support this report, but the final Proceedings should control permanent historical citation.⁵

The final-day Reporter coverage confirms that the convention concluded shortly before 10:00 a.m. Mountain Standard Time.³ The official convention page identifies the gathering as the 69th Regular Convention, held July 18-23 in Phoenix under the theme “Christ Is Risen Indeed.”¹⁸

Opening theological frame

Matins centered on Paul's proclamation that the mortal will put on immortality and that death has been swallowed up in Christ's victory. Espinosa stressed that Christian steadfastness does not arise from successful resolutions, balanced budgets, institutional peace, physical health, or human control. It comes from the mysteries of Christ: His incarnation, death, resurrection, Word, Baptism, and Holy Supper.⁶

“Thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. Therefore, my beloved brothers, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord.”

1 Corinthians 15:57-58

■ 2. Delegate Briefing

Thursday morning was short, compressed, and consequential. The assembly used the president's proposed shortened schedule without objection, completed selected Mercy and National Witness business, resolved a lingering bylaw-procedure problem, considered two new delegate resolutions, and adjourned the convention.

Compressed final schedule Delegates accepted the president's shorter timetable without objection. That choice determined which proposals could still receive consideration.	Consent calendar adopted Resolutions 3-03A and 3-05A passed together after only 9.46 percent supported removing 3-05A.
Resolution 10-08 ratified The convention cured the written-notice problem and finalized language assigning the determination of extenuating circumstances to the Synod president.	Mercy and Witness completed Counseling, addiction, apologetics, urban ministry, and family resolutions all passed.
Martyrdom resolution passed The amendment deleting the Charlie Kirk paragraph failed. The main resolution passed with 79.04 percent support.	Visa resolution not considered The motion to extend the orders of the day failed to reach two-thirds, so the religious-worker resolution never came before the assembly.

Delegate takeaway

There is no Friday business session. Upon adjournment *sine die*, unreached proposals died as convention business. They may still be pursued through Synod offices, districts, boards, new overtures, or the 2029 convention, but they are not pending before the 2026 convention.

■ 4. Full Chronological Session Narrative

A. Matins and the Resurrection of the Body

The session opened with hymnody, psalmody, and 1 Corinthians 15:50-58. The text proclaimed the transformation of the mortal body, the defeat of death, and the call to remain steadfast in the Lord's work.⁶

Espinosa addressed two distorted responses to mortality. One idolizes and attempts to preserve the body through vanity, technological fantasies, and fear-driven control. The other abuses the body through intoxication, despair, immorality, and reckless pleasure. Christian hope neither despises nor worships the body. The body is God's creation, redeemed by Christ and promised resurrection.

The sermon's pastoral examples made that hope concrete. A woman living with ALS continued to receive Christ's Word and Sacrament with joy while her husband embodied faithful marital love. The martyr Blandina confessed Christ under torture. Their courage did not arise from temperament or self-mastery, but from the risen Lord.

For preaching and teaching

The final day's most important distinction was not between winning and losing convention coalitions. It was between human arrangements, which cannot defeat death, and Christ's resurrection, which gives the Church its life and courage.

B. Opening of Business, Memorials, and Credentials

President Harrison thanked the worship team and reflected on the vulnerability delegates experience when speaking before a large convention. He encouraged delegates not to be ashamed of an imperfect microphone appearance. The promised Atlantic District memorial material was then shown.

Committee 11 reported 944 registered voting delegates, 161 advisory delegates, 170 advisory representatives, and 173 guests and others. The report was received by voice vote. No nominations or elections occurred Thursday.⁷

C. Consent Calendar

The Thursday consent calendar contained Resolution 3-03A, concerning disaster response and district coordinators, and Resolution 3-05A, concerning worker wellness and participation in Concordia Plan Services.

A Michigan delegate sought to remove 3-05A. The motion was nondebatable and required the amended 15 percent threshold. Only 9.46 percent supported removal, so the resolution stayed on consent. The calendar then passed by voice vote.⁷

Procedural distinction

The 9.46 percent result was not a vote against worker wellness. It measured only whether enough delegates wanted separate consideration. Adoption came with the later voice vote on the full consent calendar.

The printed issue contained an internal inconsistency: the operative rule stated the new 15 percent threshold, while a following whereas still referred to ten percent. The chair applied 15 percent.²

D. Final-Day Schedule and Approval of Wednesday Minutes

Without objection, the assembly operated under the president's proposed shorter schedule rather than the previously adopted noon schedule. That action removed several separately printed blocks and moved the convention toward adjournment before 10:00 a.m. The Wednesday minutes were then approved without substantive correction.

Why the schedule mattered

On the final day, a schedule is not merely a clock. It becomes a gatekeeper. Business that cannot be reached before the adopted adjournment point dies unless the assembly suspends or extends the orders of the day.

E. Delegate Resolution on Seat Assignments

Rev. Aaron Yaeger moved a resolution requiring future issues of *Today's Business* to publish voting-delegate seat assignments before the opening business session. Supporters argued that delegates should be able to find one another for direct, brotherly conversation. Opponents warned that public seating charts could encourage vote whipping, pressure, intimidation, and political tactics.

The previous question carried. A voice vote appeared negative, and a division was requested. The electronic result confirmed defeat with 36.60 percent in favor.³

F. Ratification of Resolution 10-08

The chair explained that the convention had adopted an amendment to Bylaw 4.2.4 on Wednesday before the amendment had been furnished to the convention in writing. Issue 6 now printed the wording. The motion to ratify cured that notice problem.²

The bylaw now provides that, except in extenuating circumstances **“as determined by the Synod President,”** the Synod president or his representative shall install or reinstall an elected district president before the district convention concludes.

After an initial voice vote, the queue was reopened because a delegate reported that his entry disappeared. A speaker who attempted to debate the substance was ruled out of order. Tim Eden asked what ratification meant and what vote was required. The parliamentarian explained that the convention was curing the written-notice defect, not reconsidering the policy, and that a majority was sufficient. The final voice vote ratified the action.⁸

Governance caution

The text names the Synod president as decision-maker but does not define extenuating circumstances, require consultation, provide a written-reasons standard, or establish review or appeal. Those are implementation questions to watch during the triennium.

G. Initial Introduction of the Martyrdom Resolution

Ethan Thompson introduced the delegate resolution “To Address Modern Day Martyrdom.” It thanked God for persecuted Christians, encouraged remembrance of martyrs, and urged pastors to prepare congregations for faithfulness unto death. One whereas referred to the assassination of Charlie Kirk and suspicions that his faith influenced the attacker's motive. Before debate began, the orders of the day moved the convention to Floor Committee 3. The queue was preserved.

H. Resolution 3-04A, Counseling and Telehealth

Resolution 3-04A encouraged church workers to view professional counseling as faithful stewardship and commended confessionally aligned counseling and telehealth for burnout, depression, anxiety, suicidality, family distress, financial stress, and addictive behavior. It directed the Office of National Mission, Concordia Plan Services, and appropriate entities to study a Synodwide telehealth network.⁹

A delegate moved to replace every use of “telehealth” with “mental health” to broaden the resolution. The committee noted that the change would create incoherent phrases such as “in person or via mental health.” The chair ruled the amendment out of order because it functioned as a substitute resolution rather than a coherent amendment.

A health-care professional supported the telehealth language as a practical way to expand access where no local provider exists. Debate closed, and the resolution passed by voice vote.³

I. Resolution 3-06A, Addiction

Resolution 3-06A directs the Office of National Mission to identify and share ways congregations and RSOs can bring Christ's hope to people affected by addiction and report to the 2029 convention. It encourages each district to establish at least one new partnership with a faith-based addiction-care ministry by 2029.

An advisory delegate described congregational ministry among people facing homelessness, substance abuse, and mental-health challenges. She held together God's Word, prayer, Christian fellowship, accountability, mercy, and appropriate medical and counseling vocations.

A delegate asked why gambling, internet and gaming addiction, compulsive shopping, and pornography were not named. The committee said the wording followed the original overture but understood the broader concern to include such struggles. The resolution passed by voice vote, and President Harrison immediately prayed for those suffering addiction and mental illness.¹⁰

J. Resolution 1-10, Apologetics and Cultural Idolatry

Resolution 1-10 directs the Office of National Mission to survey forms of idolatry in American culture and identify or develop Christian apologetics resources with CPH, seminaries, universities, Lutheran Hour Ministries, RSOs, and other partners.

A delegate urged attention to entertainment and music culture. Another supported distinctly Lutheran resources while acknowledging the usefulness of some non-Lutheran apologetics material. The resolution passed by unanimous voice vote.³

K. Resolution 1-06A, Urban Congregations and Schools

Resolution 1-06A thanks God for urban congregations and schools and asks ONM to work with districts to strengthen networking, resource sharing, grant knowledge, administrative support, and local access to demographic data. The final wording uses service verbs such as *work with*, *advise*, and *share upon request*. It passed by unanimous voice vote.¹¹

L. Resolution 1-11A, God's Design for the Family

Resolution 1-11A states the Synod's religious objection to government interference with Christian parents' duty to raise children in the faith. It encourages the use of family-ministry resources and public confession of biblical truth. A delegate supported the resolution by contrasting the Synod's confession with developments in other church bodies concerning marriage, family, and human identity. It passed unanimously by voice vote.¹¹

M. Recognition of Convention and Synod Staff

The chair and secretary recognized staff responsible for registration, elections, travel, hospitality, doctrinal review, administration, and convention operations. This was not legislative action, but it publicly thanked the people who kept the convention functioning while the assembly deliberated.

N. Resumed Debate on Modern-Day Martyrdom

Thompson argued that several overtures had expressed concern about martyrdom and that confirmands promise faithfulness unto death. Jonathan Rusche moved to delete the paragraph referring to Kirk.

Strongest case for deletion

- The criminal motive remained unsettled, and the convention should not adopt a premise later evidence might disprove.
- Kirk's public work was strongly political, risking confusion between Christian martyrdom and partisan identity.
- The resolution could teach martyrdom more broadly and unify more delegates without the contemporary reference.
- Christians of differing political views should not be made to feel outside the Church.

Strongest case for retaining the language

- The wording did not formally declare Kirk a martyr.
- It acknowledged pastoral questions and concern generated by his death.
- His public Christian testimony could be recognized without full agreement with his theology or politics.
- The wording offered a possible compromise by naming the controversy without deciding the martyr-status question.

When the orders of the day arrived, the queue closed. The amendment failed electronically, although no numerical result was announced. The main resolution passed with 79.04 percent support according to the chair's announcement.¹²

Exact meaning

The resolution encourages teaching and remembrance of martyrs and retains the Kirk paragraph. It does **not** expressly declare Charlie Kirk a Christian martyr.

O. The Religious-Worker Resolution Was Not Reached

Tim Eden raised a point of order on behalf of Joshua Salzberg, who had apparently been waiting to introduce a published resolution supporting international church workers affected by visa restrictions. The chair acknowledged the missed queue entry and apologized.

Consideration required a two-thirds vote to extend the orders of the day. The extension failed. The underlying resolution was never debated, amended, adopted, or rejected on its merits.¹³

Do not misstate the result

The failed extension was a vote about whether to take up the resolution after the adopted adjournment point. It was not a vote against international religious workers, visa advocacy, or the resolution's policy substance.

P. Itinerarium and Adjournment

The assembly entered the Itinerarium, praying that the Lord would direct delegates in peace and prosperity and bring them home in safety and joy. The Benedictus proclaimed salvation through the forgiveness of sins and the dawn from on high. After prayer and the hymn “Holy Ghost, God and Lord,” the chair declared the 69th Regular Convention adjourned *sine die* in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. ¹⁴

■ 6. Voting Details

The transcript contains **23 distinct voting events**: five electronic votes and eighteen voice votes. Three electronic votes had announced percentages; two electronic votes had outcomes but no announced numerical percentage. Two additional actions were approved by unanimous consent rather than formal vote.

No abstention totals, invalid ballots, or raw yes-and-no counts were announced for Thursday's electronic votes. The official Reporter identified Resolutions 3-04A and 3-06A as adopted by voice and Resolutions 1-10, 1-06A, and 1-11A as adopted by unanimous voice vote.³¹⁹

■ 8. Resolution Analysis

Resolution 3-03A: Disaster Response

Purpose: Thank God for disaster-response and human-care work and require districts to appoint disaster-response coordinators.

Disposition: Adopted on consent.

Significance: Districts receive a concrete responsibility. Better coordination can strengthen preparedness and mutual aid. Districts should clarify appointment, training, succession, accountability, and coordination with existing ministries.

Resolution 3-05A: Worker Wellness

Purpose: Commend wellness work and encourage participation in Concordia Plan Services.

Disposition: Adopted on consent after removal failed.

Significance: The action is encouragement, not a compulsory health-plan mandate. Because it remained on consent, separate questions about cost, coverage, and alternatives were not debated.

Resolution 10-08: District-President Installations

Purpose: Assign the determination of extenuating circumstances to the Synod president.

Disposition: Ratified by voice.

Significance: A named decision-maker reduces uncertainty, but the text gives no explicit consultation, documentation, review, or appeal process.

Resolution 3-04A: Counseling and Telehealth

Purpose: Encourage confessionally aligned counseling access and study a Synodwide telehealth network.

Disposition: Adopted by voice.

Significance: The resolution commissions study and encouragement. It does not create, fund, or mandate a network immediately. Licensing, privacy, cost, provider standards, and confidentiality remain open.

Resolution 3-06A: Addiction

Purpose: Equip congregations and RSOs, encourage district partnerships, and report to 2029.

Disposition: Adopted by voice.

Significance: It holds together Gospel proclamation, mercy, accountability, and legitimate clinical care. Process addictions were discussed but not expressly added.

Resolution 1-10: Apologetics

Purpose: Identify cultural idols and develop or promote Lutheran apologetics resources.

Disposition: Adopted unanimously by voice.

Significance: The strongest implementation will teach Christ-centered witness rather than simply culture-war reaction or argument winning.

Resolution 1-06A: Urban Contexts

Purpose: Support networking, administrative cooperation, data access, and locally developed outreach.

Disposition: Adopted unanimously by voice.

Significance: The use of “work with,” “advise,” and “upon request” reflects service rather than central control.

Resolution 1-11A: Family

Purpose: Confess parental responsibility, resist improper interference, promote resources, and encourage public witness.

Disposition: Adopted unanimously by voice.

Significance: The action is confessional and educational. It does not alter civil law, create an enforcement agency, or replace careful Two Kingdoms analysis.

Modern-Day Martyrdom

Purpose: Honor martyrs, teach faithfulness unto death, and recover the Church's memory of persecution.

Disposition: Adopted with 79.04 percent support.

Significance: The Kirk paragraph remains. The action acknowledges questions but does not expressly declare him a martyr. The final text should be checked against Session 9 minutes and Proceedings.

Religious Workers

Purpose: Support international workers affected by visa restrictions and encourage appropriate advocacy.

Disposition: Not considered.

Significance: No conclusion can be drawn about the assembly's position on the merits. The procedural extension failed, and adjournment ended jurisdiction.

■ 10. Nominations and Elections

No nominations were opened Thursday. No person was added to a nomination pool or ballot, elected, declared ineligible, or removed from a ballot. The credentials report concerned attendance and registration, not election results. All ordinary election work had been completed before Session 9.

Accuracy rule

Recognition of previously elected officers or staff is not a new election. A final-day report should not describe Thursday as electing an officer or board member.

■ 11. Reports, Announcements, and Financial Information

Credentials and memorials

The final credentials report listed 944 registered voting delegates. The assembly also viewed the Atlantic District memorial material requested the previous day.

Staff recognition

The president and secretary thanked the staff responsible for administration, registration, elections, travel, hospitality, doctrinal review, church relations, and convention operations.

Financial information

No new quantified appropriation, grant total, fundraising goal, or budget amendment was announced Thursday. The financial implications of a telehealth network, addiction partnerships, urban assistance, disaster-response coordinators, apologetics work, and family resources remain implementation questions.

■ 12. Procedural and Governance Significance

The schedule decided what could live

The shorter schedule sharply limited the available path for new delegate business. Final-day time rules determine which proposals receive deliberation.

Consent removal is not a merits vote

The 9.46 percent result tested only whether 3-05A would receive separate consideration.

Division replaces uncertainty with a count

The electronic result on seat assignments became the controlling outcome after the voice vote was challenged.

Ratification cured procedure without reopening substance

The 10-08 vote addressed written notice, not the underlying policy choice.

A sweeping amendment may function as a substitute

The telehealth amendment would have altered the structure of the resolution and produced incoherent wording.

Orders of the day can end unresolved debate

The martyrdom queue closed when the convention reached the adopted adjournment business.

Two-thirds protected the adopted schedule

The religious-worker resolution could not be reached without extending the orders of the day.

Adjournment sine die ends jurisdiction

Unreached proposals do not remain silently pending after the convention ends. The governing bylaw framework should be checked in the LCMS Handbook when applying these procedural consequences.¹⁷

Open question: How will licensing, financing, confidentiality, and provider standards work?

Speculation to avoid: Do not claim a new healthcare system was established.

Urban Ministry

Confirmed effect: ONM and districts are to provide networking and requested assistance.

Reasonable implication: Congregations may share administrative capacity and outreach data.

Open question: Will smaller ministries gain access without burdensome centralization?

Speculation to avoid: Do not claim Synod offices now control urban congregations.

Apologetics

Confirmed effect: Resource coordination is assigned.

Reasonable implication: Apologetics may receive greater emphasis in schools, congregations, and universities.

Open question: Will resources equip patient witness or mostly reactive culture-war engagement?

Speculation to avoid: Do not treat every cultural disagreement as idolatry.

Martyrdom

Confirmed effect: The Synod encourages teaching and remembrance of martyrs.

Reasonable implication: Confirmation instruction may give greater attention to faithfulness unto death.

Open question: How will contemporary figures be evaluated?

Speculation to avoid: Do not say the convention canonized Charlie Kirk or formally declared him a martyr.

■ 17. Kingdom over Castle Analysis

“Kingdom over Castle” is a project ministry lens, not an official LCMS convention term. The Harvest Partnership values of Spirit's Sending, Kingdom Focus, Open-Handed Generosity, Humility, and Trust help test whether adopted structures actually serve Gospel witness and congregations.¹⁵ The Great Distractions lens further asks whether institutional activity serves the Great Sending or becomes a substitute for it.¹⁶

Disaster Response

Connection: Direct. Coordinators can equip congregations and build trusted partnerships. The danger is creating reporting offices that do not strengthen local readiness.

Counseling and Telehealth

Connection: Direct. Shared capacity may give isolated workers access to care. Humility recognizes that church workers sometimes need professional help.

Addiction Partnerships

Connection: Direct. The resolution encourages districts to partner with existing ministries instead of assuming the Synod must build everything itself.

Urban Congregations and Schools

Connection: Especially strong. Shared bookkeeping, payroll, insurance knowledge, demographic data, and grants embody high accountability with low control.

Apologetics

Connection: Reasonable but indirect. Resources can equip witness. Kingdom focus asks whether neighbors actually hear Christ rather than merely whether insiders win arguments.

Family Confession

Connection: Direct. The action equips homes, schools, and congregations, but should not reduce family ministry to institutional messaging.

Martyrdom

Connection: Mixed. Remembering martyrs strengthens courage. Trust is weakened when unsettled political or factual claims become attached to theological commemoration.

Religious Workers

Connection: Direct, but no convention action. The published proposal sought to care for workers and congregations. Future work must proceed through other lawful channels.

For the Synod President and District Presidents

Grant wisdom, humility, and mutual trust as Bylaw 4.2.4 is implemented. Keep authority in service to Christ's Church.

For Church Workers

Comfort those who are weary, anxious, depressed, isolated, addicted, or afraid to seek help. Provide faithful pastors, counselors, physicians, friends, and congregations.

For People Suffering Addiction

Break chains of slavery, grant repentance and healing, sustain families, and let congregations speak both the seriousness of sin and the greater mercy of Christ.

For Persecuted Christians

Strengthen those who confess Christ under threat. Comfort prisoners, widows, children, missionaries, and congregations living amid violence.

For Christian Witness

Give the Church apologetic courage without arrogance, clarity without cruelty, and conviction without fear.

For Families

Strengthen marriages, parents, children, schools, and congregations in the daily hearing and teaching of Your Word.

For International Workers

Open lawful paths for ministry, advocacy, pastoral care, and congregational stability.

For the Whole Church

Keep us steadfast, not because every resolution was wise or every speech perfect, but because Christ has been raised from the dead.

The final session opened with Matins and a sermon from 1 Corinthians 15 proclaiming the resurrection of the body and reminding delegates that steadfastness does not come from resolutions or institutional success, but from Christ crucified and risen. The convention adopted two consent-calendar resolutions, rejected a proposal to publish delegate seat assignments, ratified the district-president installation bylaw amendment, adopted counseling, addiction, apologetics, urban-ministry, and family resolutions, passed a modern-day martyrdom resolution after rejecting an amendment removing its Charlie Kirk paragraph, failed to extend the session to consider a religious-worker visa resolution, prayed for safe travel, and adjourned sine die.

Decisions and Results

- Remove 3-05A from consent: failed, 9.46 percent.
- 3-03A and 3-05A: adopted.
- Delegate seat assignments: failed, 36.60 percent in favor.
- 10-08: ratified by voice.
- 3-04A and 3-06A: adopted by voice.
- 1-10, 1-06A, and 1-11A: adopted unanimously by voice.
- Martyrdom amendment: failed.
- Martyrdom resolution: passed, 79.04 percent.
- Extend for religious-worker resolution: failed to reach two-thirds.

No convention business remains pending. The religious-worker resolution was not considered and died at adjournment.

■ Closing Gospel Frame

The convention did not end with a triumphant resolution, parliamentary ruling, or election announcement. It ended with prayer for the road home.

Delegates return to congregations where people are grieving, rejoicing, raising children, battling addiction, carrying anxiety, serving neighbors, and approaching death. They do not primarily need a convention winner. They need Christ.

No bylaw raises the dead.

No election forgives sin.

No resolution gives immortality.

No parliamentary victory preserves the Church.

But Christ has been raised from the dead.

Because He lives, the Church can confess clearly, repent honestly, disagree charitably, serve generously, and labor without fear.
